Purpose of Class:

The purpose of this class is to prepare Kansas for the expansion of gambling by giving an overview of the issues and discussing the impact on individuals, families, and communities. Topics will include: an overview of legislation that created the expansion, regulation, social costs, recovery, prevention, treatment, research, and enforcement.

Objectives of Class:**As a result of participating in this class, participants will be able to:**

1. Locate and briefly describe the purpose of Senate Bill 66 Legislation which created the expansion of gambling in Kansas.
2. Identify the ways the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission (KRGC) promotes and enforces responsible gambling: casino rules and regulations, enforcement, self-exclusion, and each casino's responsible gaming plan.
3. Describe the role of the Kansas Responsible Gambling Alliance.
4. Identify the state agency that promotes public policy and ensures quality services for the prevention and treatment of problem gambling in Kansas: Kansas Social and Rehabilitation Services, Disability and Behavioral Health Services, Addiction and Prevention Services.
5. Describe the six service components of the Problem Gambling and Addiction Grant Fund.
6. Explain duty of care in state owned and operated casinos and the opportunity for intervention at the casino level; myths and facts regarding gambling.
7. Observe how tribal casinos practice duty of care in promoting responsible gambling.
8. Describe the role of the Kansas Coalition on Problem Gambling.
9. Identify social support groups for those experiencing problem gambling or affected by someone's gambling: Gambler's Anonymous/GamAnon Panel.
10. Describe the six service components of a problem gambling fund.
11. Describe how a problem gambling therapeutic court handles the cases of problem gamblers.
12. Describe the core strategies for forming a comprehensive problem gambling prevention program.
13. Define problem and pathological gambling, give a brief history of gambling, describe the prevalence of the gambling problem, and describe the neurophysiology of gambling.
14. Describe evidence-based clinical practices for treating problem gambling: teens, adults, older adults, other special populations.
15. Describe money management approaches for dealing with personal financial issues due to problem gambling.
16. Describe clinical research implications for treating problem gambling.
17. Know who to contact in a problem gambling crisis: Crisis Intervention Helpline.
18. Know how to become a certified problem gambling counselor.
